FAITH PERSPECTIVES ON THE MIDDLE EAST CRISIS – 28 April 7pm

You are invited to a meeting at St Mark's Church, Broomfield Road, Broomhill, Sheffield from 7 pm to 8.45 pm on Sunday 28 April at which we will consider the current Middle East crisis from the point of view of the three religious faiths that are involved -Jewish, Muslim and Christian. How can a just and lasting peace be secured?

The meeting will begin with four short talks by the following speakers:

- Revd Dr Casey Strine, Senior Lecturer in Ancient Near Eastern History and Literature and the Bishop of Sheffield's Adviser on Inter Faith Relations on Palestine as a Holy Land for three religions.
- Dima Shami from Sheffield's Palestinian community.
- Professor Jane Ginsborg Chair of Seven Hills Shul, formerly Sheffield and District Reform Jewish Congregation.
- Mark James Kairos Sheffield, a network of Christians in Sheffield concerned and active for justice and peace in the Holy Land.

These talks will be followed by Q and A and discussion. The meeting will end with a period of private prayer.



Insulate Ukraine windows are triple-glazed polyethylene windows designed provide cheap replacements for war damaged ones. They insulate like double glazing, let light through, cost only $\pounds 12$ per square metre, and can be built at home in 15 minutes from basic materials.

ENVIRONMENT GROUP UPDATE - A few weeks ago, Margaret Ainger emailed to Sheffield Central MP Paul Blomfield (St Marks is in his constituency), to express concern on behalf of the Environment Group at the pulling back of the Labour Party of the £28b Green Plan. Some of you may have also written. Here is Paul's reply:

Dear Margaret,

Thank you for writing to me about Labour's green investment plans. I'm sorry not to have replied sooner, as I would normally have done, but I've had a huge number of additional emails (around 5,000 to date) on the Gaza crisis - and I'm just catching up.

Addressing the climate emergency is the most important issue facing us; all the other challenges will count for little if we fail to provide a sustainable planet for future generations. That's why I've consistently worked on the climate emergency throughout my 14 years in Parliament (read more here and here) and am a Vice-Chair of the All-Party Group on Climate Change, chaired by Caroline Lucas. So Labour's position on climate action matters to me and I was disappointed that circumstances beyond our

control has forced us to row back a little, although the green prosperity plan remains one of our five key missions for government. You'll know that, after we made the £28billion pledge, the Truss government pushed up the cost of borrowing - transforming the ability to deliver on the pledge.

The core commitments of the green prosperity plan remain - to deliver on clean power by 2030, permanently taking hundreds of pounds off energy bills, creating half a million good jobs, making Britain energy independent, and delivering on our climate commitments.

It's right that governments borrow to invest and grow, but it requires a credible plan and responsibility with the public finances – Liz Truss showed what happens when governments get this wrong. And unfortunately, the circumstances have worsened further, with the Government damaging the economy, increasing debt and putting people's livelihoods at risk. The electorate punished Labour in 2019 when they thought we lacked a credible plan – and there's no point in having great policies if we can't implement them.

Labour though remains committed to an ambitious and bold climate and energy agenda and to the investment plans that are vital to Britain's future, funded by a proper windfall tax on oil and gas giants, alongside borrowing to invest within fiscal rules. Our plans will invest in good jobs in all parts of the country in gigafactories, clean steel plants, renewable-ready ports, green hydrogen and energy storage, through a $\pounds7.3$ billion national wealth fund that will unlock tens of billions of private sector investment. The warm homes plan will upgrade Britain's homes and cut energy bills, investing a further $\pounds6.6$ billion to double the money already committed by the Government.

On top of this, we will establish Great British Energy, a publicly owned energy company to invest in clean homegrown power, with capital of $\pounds 8.3$ billion, including $\pounds 3.3$ billion for a local power plan to invest in clean energy for local communities and enough funding to accelerate nuclear projects and position the UK as a world leader in floating offshore wind.

I hope this response has reassured you that we have the right plan for our economy and climate action, because we can't have another Tory Government with neither.
