RSPB's BIG GARDEN BIRDWATCH – Friday 23- Sunday 25 January The world's largest garden wildlife survey! Last year, nearly 600,000 people took part and over nine million birds were counted. We've lost a staggering 38 million birds from UK skies in the last 60 years. With birds facing so many challenges, it's more important than ever to get involved in the Birdwatch. To take part, spend one hour counting the birds you see in one location – your garden, balcony or a local park. Submit your findings to the RSPB. CHANGE IN WORKING PATTERN AND IMPACT ON FRIDAY MORNING AND EVENING PRAYER

From 1 February, I (Shan) am changing my working pattern back to work full days on Mondays, alternate Tuesdays, Thursdays and Sundays instead of 5 mornings a week plus Sundays. This is to help me try to regain a better work / personal life balance. As a result, St Mark's will not be offering morning or evening prayer on Zoom on a Friday. This will be reviewed once Helena starts after Easter. In the meantime, the option to join St John's Ranmoor for morning prayer will remain but they do not do evening prayer on Zoom. Beth and myself will aim to host Monday to Thursdays as previously.

LENT GROUPS - Exploring Social Justice: Critical Issues Defining our Time

This year's Lent Course will focus on what it means to seek justice for some of the most vulnerable members of society. Each session will explore social justice through the lens of one of five topics: identity; inequality; disability; asylum; social disintegration. Resource packs will include bible passages,

briefings, first-hand testimonies, images, prayers, questions and reflections so that each group or individual can shape the course to reflect their interests, needs or learning styles.

Groups will gather weekly, 5 times during Lent (18 Feb – 28 March) on different days, at different times, in different places, in person and online, so that as many people as possible are able to participate.

Rita Brock: Rising Fascism and threats to democracy today: the role of moral injury

6pm Tuesday 3 February 2026

Convened by the International Centre for Moral Injury at Durham University, who say:

"The US is currently threatened with a collapse of its democracy, which has global implications. In this session we will examine how the theological system of white Christian nationalism constructs moral injury as a driver of fascism. We will, as well, consider strategies for resistance and surviving the next decade, including what religious communities may offer to address moral injury and sustain moral resistance for the long struggle ahead.

Rita Nakashima Brock, RelM, MA, PhD (she, her) is the first Asian American woman to earn a doctorate in philosophy of religion and theology in 1988. A scholar, educator, editor, mentor to women of colour scholars, and award-winning author, Dr Brock is a recognised expert on moral injury."

PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE IMMIGRATION RULES – You have an important chance to make your views known on the government's proposed changes to the immigration rules. Amnesty says: "In summary, the proposals are dreadful. They are intended and would make life considerably harsher, more uncertain, more marginalised for many refugees and migrants in the UK. The Government generally intends to make refugees and migrants unwelcome in the UK unless they are regarded as highly skilled or relatively wealthy." You can decide what you think by looking at the consultation papers which are available through the Home Office consultation, which is available at <https://www.gov.uk/government/consultations/earned-settlement>. The consultation response form is available on that link. **Responses must be received by midnight on 12 February**. Amnesty have produced a very helpful guidance form. <https://www.amnesty.org.uk/resources/guidance-responding-fairer-pathway-settlement-consultation>. I strongly recommend using it. This is not a quick job. It takes the best part of an hour (less if you don't add comments) but it is important that we make our views known. Please do it. Michael Bayley


UPDATE RE SHEFFIELD GREEN BOND

The Soup Run has been operating for many years and provides food and drinks for those unfortunately living on the streets of the City. The number of people we serve varies from month to month, but a few months ago we served over 20 people on one evening.

Over the last few years our numbers have dwindled and we now have only one group going out each month. Prior to Covid we had sufficient numbers to cover every week and we would like to try and get back to that position. As a volunteer you would be involved in preparing sandwiches and drinks in the kitchen at St Marks and then walking around the city centre serving anyone in need. If you are interested in becoming a Leader, you would be additionally responsible for liaising with team members and ensuring that there are adequate stocks of drinks & food. The current group meets on Sunday evenings at 5pm and are generally finished before 7pm, a relatively modest commitment.

ECO TIPS:



In October 2025, the Government committed to introduce legislation to end the sale of peat. The Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) are leading the way in getting growers, manufacturers and their own gardens transitioned to become Peat-Free.

From 2026, no new peat is allowed to enter RHS gardens or retail.

This is one area we can all contribute to.

As home gardeners, we need to understand that peat-free growing media is different than we are used to because it is more biologically active and has a shorter shelf-life. If you search RHS guidance on using peat-free compost, they have lots of tips to help you achieve the best results.
