DIOCESAN STRATEGIC PROGRAMME UPDATE: On Monday, 13 October members of Sheffield Diocesan Strategic Programme Team will be updating Hallam and Ecclesfield Deanery Synods on:

- the refreshed Diocesan Strategy
- what the funding recently secured from the national church can be used for
- what this means for our twinned Deaneries of Hallam and Ecclesfield.

This is an open meeting so that interested members of our churches can attend if they would like to do so. The meeting will be at Christ Church, Stannington, starting at 7.30 pm. PARISH GIVING SCHEME The PGS website will be taken offline from 3pm Monday 13 October, remaining unavailable until the new system launches on Thursday 30 October. During this time, PGS will be unable to register or amend regular or one-off gifts.

NEW DATES FOR DEMENTIA STARS TRAINING – The daytime September Dementia Stars course led by Grace Stead of Enrichment for the Elderly has been very popular and helped attendees better understand how somebody with dementia experiences the world around them. Grace has agreed to lead an evening course in November. The course consists of 3x2 hour sessions (Bronze, Silver and Gold) on 3 successive Thursdays. There is no fee to attend and it is important to try to attend all the sessions for greatest understanding. A certificate and badge are awarded to each participant attending each level. There is no test or exam. The course is suitable for welcomers, those involved in pastoral care and family or professional carers of people with dementia but is not for people who are themselves on the dementia pathway. The course will be held on Thursdays 13th, 20th and 27th November 6.30-

8.30pm at Ranmoor Parish Centre, 5, Ranmoor Park Road, (Opposite St John's Church). You can find a sign up sheet on the noticeboard if you wish to attend. See Shan for more information.

DO NOT 'CO-OPT' THE CROSS TO DIVIDE A group of Church of England bishops and clergy have joined other senior leaders from across denominations in signing a joint letter voicing concern at the use of Christian symbols, particularly the cross, at last week's 'Unite the Kingdom' rally.

The letter acknowledges that many of those involved in the rally felt a "deep sense of frustration at feeling unheard and forgotten in the democratic process" but that it also included "racist, anti-Muslim and far right elements". They write "As Christians from different theological and political backgrounds we stand together against the misuse of Christianity. The cross is the ultimate sign of sacrifice for the other. Jesus calls us to love both our neighbours and our enemies and to welcome the stranger. Any co-opting or corrupting of the Christian faith to exclude others is unacceptable."

THANK YOU'S

PHASE – The concert raising money for Phase held on 26 September at St Mark's was enjoyed by a full church and raised over £3000 thanks to your generosity. Thank you to everyone who helped and attended. It was great to have information about how Phase is working in remote areas of Nepal to improve nutrition and maternal health.

FAIR TRADE - to everyone who ran or purchased produce from the Fair Trade stall recently. Good Taste were delighted that you spent £234.66. They aim to provide a market for high-quality fair trade goods which demonstrate the talent and ingenuity of the producers and enable them to earn a living and provide for their families. All their profits go to support 'TASTE', a charity working in Nigeria to provide clean drinking water and sanitation facilities to the local people.

DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC OF CONGO - to everyone who donated directly to Richard Hides appeal for financial contributions to support the children in the Democratic Republic of Congo who are unable to attend school because they don't have uniforms, a satchel or books. He has transferred £538 to Adelipo. Without education these children face a cycle of poverty, trauma and instability and miss out on the opportunity to rebuild their future so thank you for helping.

**Faith encounters disability
Challenges and Insights**

The Reverend Frances Young, OBE, FBA

Frances Young, the mother of Arthur, who was born with profound learning disabilities, taught Theology at the University of Birmingham from 1971 to 2002. In mid-life she was ordained as a Methodist minister, and now in retirement regularly leads worship in the churches of the Sheffield Circuit. After Arthur's death aged 54, with her husband now aged 90, they moved to Sheffield to be near family support. Her books, *Face to Face* (1985, 1990) and *Arthur's Call* (2014), tell Arthur's story and explore faith in relation to her family experience.

CHURCH ACTION ON POVERTY URBAN PILGRIMAGE – Saturday 11 October

Firvale, Upper Wincobank and Firth Park. We will gather between 9 am and 930 am at St Cuthbert's Church, Barnsley Road, opposite Northern General Hospital, for our opening service and briefings on the Church's food bank etc. We shall then set off for Upper Wincobank Nondenominational Chapel, founded in 1841 by Mary Ann Rawson, the famous anti-slavery campaigner. From there, we go to Firth Park Methodist Church for our packed lunches and final discussion, ending by 2.30 pm.

It is a picturesque, diverse and cosmopolitan area, which has faced its share of challenges in recent years. We shall walk about 2 ½ miles altogether, including some uphill and downhill stretches. Parking

SUPPORTED LODGINGS Event – Wednesday 12 November. 5.30pm at the Town Hall.

Supported Lodgings is a relatively new service being run by the fostering service for young people aged 16-21. The fostering service say 'the requirement for their hosts are less than for being a foster carer (e.g. they can provide a home for a young person and be in fulltime work) we think the scheme works particularly well for young refugee young people (also known as Unaccompanied Asylum seeking children or UASC). Sheffield city Council Fostering Service have had people from really diverse backgrounds apply and feel that there may be a whole load of people out there who would be up for considering being a host but who just don't know about their scheme in the same way that people know and understand about fostering.'
