Generous God, we are drawn by the temptations of consumerism, but lose sight of our human value.


Generous God, We store up goods for ourselves but others are in need.

Mysterious God, we discern your wisdom in the ordering of the universe and the rhythm of the seasons; in the purposefulness of creation and the pattern of our days.


From the origins of our species, you called us into covenant to cultivate Paradise and make manifest the beauty of the earth.


When we made gods of ourselves and abused our freedoms, you inspired prophets and sages to challenge our pretensions and guide us in your ways.






Godof truthand love.

Come, Spirit of Jesus, come, Breath of Life, stir within us and rest upon this bread and wine that, sharing in communion, we may be united in Christ and restored to covenant with all who bear the image of their creator and long for the day when healing shall rise up with the dawn and justice roll down like an ever-flowing stream. We break this bread in solidarity with the brokenness of the world.


In solidarity we accompany one another towards our recovery.
