DIOCESE OF SHEFFIELD SUPPORTS POSTER CAMPAIGN FOR CHRISTMAS

New posters sharing Jesus' love for all this Christmas have been launched in the Diocese of Leeds. The Rt Revd Arun Arora, co-lead Bishop for Racial Justice for the Church of England and Bishop of Kirkstall, has launched a poster campaign sharing messages of hope and welcome to all this Christmas. The posters can be shown anywhere, but are designed to be seen at bus stops, telling people the good news of Jesus' birth and the love he brought into the world for all. This resource is also being made available in the Diocese of Sheffield, and is supported by our Racial Justice team.

Revd Anesia Cook, Racial Justice Officer for the Diocese of Sheffield, said:

'These posters remind us of the true meaning of the Incarnation, that God became flesh and entered our world as a vulnerable baby. Taking on flesh and entering a world composed of violence, now and then, is a radical act of becoming one with the underside of history, Christmas is the beginning of the Jesus story which invites us to reconsider God's love for us and for each other. Christmas invites us

too to "Love our neighbours as ourselves", we are called to treat others with the same care and respect we desire for ourselves, reflecting God's love and goodwill to all people, regardless of their place birth or the colour of their skin, during this Christmas season and beyond."

TV INTERVIEW – For those of you who know Wendy Maas, you may like to watch Antiques Roadtrip which is being broadcast on BBC I on Friday I2 December at 16.30. Wendy was interviewed by Charles Hanson about her Great Great Grandmother Mrs Susan Sunderland who was known as the 'Calderdale Nightingale' and 'The Yorkshire Queen' and who sang for Queen Victoria. Her legacy continues through the 'Annual Mrs Sunderland Music Festival' in Huddersfield. You can also find the programme (Antiques Road trip Series 28:25 – Sing for your supper) on iplayer and Wendy features I2 minutes 45 seconds into the recording.

REITH LECTURES 2025 – Several people have recommended this years Reith Lectures called "Moral Revolution" which can be found on BBC Sounds. Rutger Bregnan explores the moral decay and un-seriousness of today's elites, drawing historical parallels to past eras of corruption that preceded transformative movements especially the 19th Century campaign to abolish slavery. In his series, he argues that small, committed groups can spark moral revolutions, emphasizing the importance of perseverance and long-term vision. Bregman advocates for a new "realist utopia" in the face of rapid technological change, promoting ideas like Universal Basic Income, fairer taxation and responsible tech regulation. Finally, he zooms out to reflect on humanity's strange historical trajectory, warning of the existential risks posed by unchecked Al and urging privileged individuals to take on an active role in shaping a better future.

ST MARK'S SOUP RUN - Volunteers and Leaders Required

The Soup Run has been operating for many years and provides food and drinks for those unfortunately living on the streets of the City. The number of people we serve varies from month to month, but a few months ago we served over 20 people on one evening.

Over the last few years our numbers have dwindled and we now have only one group going out each month. Prior to Covid we had sufficient numbers to cover every week and we would like to try and get back to that position.

As a volunteer you would be involved in preparing sandwiches and drinks in the kitchen at St Marks and then walking around the city centre serving anyone in need. If you are interested in becoming a Leader, you would be additionally responsible for liaising with team members and ensuring that there are adequate stocks of drinks & food.

The current group meets on Sunday evenings at 5pm and are generally finished before 7pm, a relatively modest commitment.

If you are interested a taster session can be arranged, the current team will be next out mid-January (date to be confirmed)

Advent 25 days of action



- Bring items to church for the food bank.
- Write to your MP about child poverty or universal credit levels.
- nonate money to the Children's Society at our Christingle Service.
- Donate a sleeping bag or blanket to Ben's Centre or The Archer Project.
- Join in with the Sandwich Run, giving out food and drink to those sleeping rough.
- Volunteer with HARC, homeless and rootless at Christmas.
- Read the Sheffield Poverty Truth Report, Finding the Root Cause.
- Bonate pre-loved items to ASSIST to furnish accommodation for those seeking asylum
- Contact your MP to urge for a fairer asylum system.
- ? Find out about Lift the Ban campaign, consider how you could support this.
- Find out about Hope at Home. Consider hosting a survivor of slavery.
- Learn one new thing about the UK asylum system and share it on social media.
- Join a peaceful vigil, protest or prayer walk.
- Write for Rights. Write a letter with Amnesty International supporting political prisoners.
- Read a book on liberation theology, poverty or social justice.
- Invite a neighbour or church member who lives alone for tea or Sunday lunch.
- Reduce your consumption.
- file Join in with or organise a litter pick around your community.
- Practise 'buy less, give more' this Christmas.
- Donate money to Amnesty, SAYiT, Hope at Home and USPG at our Christmas services.
- Call or visit someone you know who might find this season difficult.
- Donate baby and toddler clothing, bedding, toys, books and equipment to Baby Basics.
- Pray for peace.
- Join in with carol singing at a care home.
