HOLY WEEK & EASTER AT ST MARK'S

SPRING FORWARD CLOCK CHANGE UK clocks go forward on hour at 1am Sunday 29 March

Palm Sunday – 29 March

10am Parish Eucharist. We begin Holy Week with a dramatic reading of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem. This service will also be on zoom.

7pm Via Dolorosa. A reflective service of readings and music, moving prayerfully through the journey to the cross.

Maundy Thursday – 2 April

7pm Maundy Thursday Service. A communion service, including a drama depicting the Last Supper and foot washing. We gather around the table as Jesus did with his disciples, before moving into a powerful, quiet time of watching and waiting. The service includes theological reflection and ends with the stripping of the altar, followed by The Watch: an opportunity to wait in silence and pray.

Good Friday – 3 April

9.45am All Age Activities with crafts & hot cross buns. A welcoming space for all ages to engage with the story of Good Friday in creative ways followed by a Sensory Faith Walk and picnic which starts from church at 10.30am.

12–3pm Meditation at the foot of the Cross. Our Good Friday reflections will be different from last year, offering more space for reflection on the events and theology of Good Friday. We will explore themes of violence, power, and atonement, with homilies, reflection, silence and music. You are welcome to stay for the three hours as we move through the different aspects of the Good Friday story. It is also possible to come for a shorter section of the time. From 12.30 – 1.30pm there will be a childcare space upstairs, led by Hannah, for any parents or carers who would like to join in with the service in church.

Easter Day – 5 April

6am Dawn Service on the Green. We greet the risen Christ at sunrise with a Taizé service which begins outdoors around the fire and then moves into church where we renew baptismal vows, celebrate communion, and conclude with a breakfast of hot cross buns, pastries and coffee.

8am BCP Communion. A quieter, traditional celebration of the resurrection. This service will also be on zoom.

10am Festive All-Age Service. A joyful celebration as we share in the good news of Easter together, followed by an Easter Egg Hunt on the Green. This service will also be on Zoom.

There is no Night Service on Easter Day.

Whether you come to one service or join us throughout the week, you are very welcome. Holy Week offers us a chance to journey together through reflection, story, and hope, as we move from the cross to the joy of resurrection.

Joining the roll is a good way to sign up to being part of St Marks.


1. Being on the electoral roll means you are eligible to vote at our Annual Parochial Church Meeting on 26 April. This year is a partial revision of the roll, which means if you are already on the electoral roll, you don't need to fill in a form. There will be a 'names only' copy of the form out of the back of church so you can check if you're not sure if you are on it. To be on the roll you need to be baptised, be 16 years old or over, and live in the parish or have worshipped at St Marks for 6 months. **Please place your completed forms in the letterbox provided.** Any questions, ask Pete Ryder.
2. The PCC would like to encourage people to think about how they connect and get involved with St Marks. There are lots of opportunities to help out and share your time, energy and skills. There are currently spaces on the PCC. If you would like to find out what it is like to be on the PCC please speak to Beth, Dilys or other members of the PCC. This year we are particularly looking for someone to be PCC Secretary, and for a new churchwarden, and others happy to support the wardening role. Please get in touch to find out more.

Navigating Faith, Trauma and Recovery



When trauma tears us apart, can the pieces ever truly come back together? In *The Pieces Join*, Beth Keith offers a compassionate and courageous exploration of recovery for those wounded by abuse within the Church.

While many works highlight the realities of trauma and misconduct, this book turns its gaze toward the slow, sacred process of recovery - of re-joining what has been broken. Drawing on moving personal accounts, survivor stories, and deep wells of Christian theology, Beth Keith exposes the ways in which Church systems can both harm and heal. PILGRIMAGE TO SANTIAGO SPONSORSHIP – If you would like to sponsor us, you can do so through Just Giving [here](#) or via justgiving.com and search Shan Rush or fill in the sponsor form on the notice board in church.

On Saturday 23 May, Shan and Siobhan are setting off on a pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostella in Spain. Entry to St Marks

When you walk into St Mark's you are in a corridor with a selection of solid wooden doors. It is not clear which leads into the worship area. This is not very welcoming and tends to result in doors being left open which cause cold draughts in the winter.

After consultation with the church architect a design for new doors has been agreed. These have a similar design to the originals but containing glass panels. This design has been presented to the diocese for approval.

This approval has now been received and we can progress changing the doors and making St Marks more welcoming.

The doors into the chapel are changing in a similar way.

The Solution

The new doors will cost about £6,000 to manufacture and install. This cost can be met from existing fabric reserves.

However, if you were able to help to pay for the doors we could keep the reserves for other items.

If you are interested in making a donation towards the cost of the doors please talk to David, the treasurer. Alternatively, you could simply transfer your donation to the church bank account with a reference DOORS.

In the unlikely even that the appeal raises more than the cost of the doors any additional money will be used for other fabric items.

DEMENTIA AWARENESS TRAINING

Supporting People with Dementia through Pastoral Care

Date: Tuesday 19 May, 10am Venue: Ranmoor Parish Centre, 5 Ranmoor Park Road, S10 3GX

During Dementia Action Week, Grace Stead, Director of Enrichment for the Elderly will lead this free introductory session. This two-hour session is open to Sheffield church members involved in dementia pastoral care, as well as anyone supporting someone on the dementia pathway. It will include practical guidance on communication and understanding dementia.

Dementia Stars Training

Dates: Fridays 12, 19 and 26 June at 2pm

Venue: Ranmoor Parish Centre, 5 Ranmoor Park Road, S10 3GX

The three two-hour sessions (Bronze, Silver and Gold) explore how people with dementia experience the world and how we can best support them.

The course is free. Participants receive a badge and certificate after each session as recognition of their commitment. There are no tests, and attending all three sessions is strongly recommended.
